

Club Notes

ATTENDANCE at meetings have been as follows:

1922. Sixteen meetings, attendance sixteen to forty-five, average twenty-four, sixty-nine members attended at least one meeting and twenty-six made communications.

1923. Fifteen meetings, attendance fourteen to thirty-one, average twenty-four, seventy-six members attended at least one meeting and twenty-four made communications.

1924. Sixteen meetings, attendance eighteen to forty-five, eighty-eight members attended at least one meeting and thirty-three made communications.

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At the A. O. U. meeting at Chicago, October 24-26, 1922, the Club was represented by Messrs. Stone, Rhoads, Potter, Robinson and Underdown.

At the Cambridge meeting, October 9-11, 1923, Stone, Rhoads, Robinson, Underdown were present.

At Pittsburgh, November 11-13, 1924, Stone, Emlen, Robinson, Underdown.

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The local collection of birds at the Academy of Natural Sciences has been materially increased during recent years by members of the Club. To the Stone Collection and the local material in the Hoopes collection there have now been added the collections of S. N. Rhoads, H. W. Fowler, Wm. E. Hughes, Chas. J. Pennock, F. Guy Meyers, Howard Y. Pennell, Samuel Wright and Frederick L. Clark, Henry Warrington, Alfred Redfield, George Spencer Morris, I. Norris DeHaven and all the more important specimens in the collection of Wm. L. Baily.

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Field trips were taken as follows during the years 1922-1924:

1922. February 22, to Cape May, N. J. Twenty-four members and six visitors; 45 species observed.

1922. April 14 to Mt. Holly, N. J. Eleven members and one visitor; 52 species observed. Woodcock sitting close on four eggs.

1922. May 30 to Cape May, N. J. Twelve members and two visitors; 57 species observed. An adult Little Blue Heron was the most notable.

1923. February 22, Cape May, N. J. Twenty-three members and nine visitors; 52 species observed. Mockingbird, Thrasher, Towhee, Ipswich Sparrow, Red-headed Woodpecker.

1923. March 30, Delaware City, Del. Fourteen members and one visitor; 42 species seen. Whistling Swan, Shoveller, Mockingbird (in song).

1923. May 30, Cape May, N. J. Ten members and two visitors; 68 species observed. White-rumped Sandpiper, Gray Kingbird, Yellow-throated Warbler, Short-billed Marsh Wren.

1924. February 22, Pleasantville to Somers Point, N. J. Twenty-four members and four visitors; 49 species seen.

1924. April 18, Chester Creek from Wawa to Cheyney, Pa. Six members, all water soaked, poured rain all day; 36 species seen. Crow's nest with six eggs.

1924. May 30, Cape, May, N. J. Twelve members and two visitors; 71 species. Black Tern, Mississippi Kite, Cliff Swallow.
