

Field Trips

1929. *February 22*, to Brigantine, N. J. Twenty members and five visitors participated; thirty-six species observed; Redpoll and Siskins noted.

1929. *March 29*, to Delaware City, Delaware. Thirty-four members and four visitors; Coot and Red-bellied woodpecker seen; aerie of Bald Eagle visited.

1929. *May 30*, Club invited to Norristown, Pa., through kindness of Mr. Raymond J. Middleton. Twenty-two members and two visitors present; Mr. Middleton's up-to-date trapping station inspected. Sixty-three species noted; six Upland Plover seen. Nest and eggs of Cooper's Hawk found; Warbling Vireo observed singing on nest. Regar Museum of Natural History visited where many rare mounted birds were examined.

Washington's Birthday, February 22, 1930. Outing to Brigantine, N. J. Twenty-four members and six visitors were on hand. Thirty species observed, most noteworthy being, Holboell's Grebe, Snow Buntings (flock), Ipswich Sparrow and Short-billed Marsh Wren.

Good Friday, April 18, 1930. Barnegat, via bus. Twenty-six members and seven visitors attended. Rainy weather encountered. Fifty-nine species seen, including Wood Duck, Ruffed Grouse, Shrike, species? and Louisiana Water Thrush.

Memorial Day, May 30, 1930. Cape May, N. J. Weather unsettled. Eleven members and five visitors attended. Seventy-six species observed, most noteworthy being, Little Blue Heron (9), Virginia Rail and Cliff Swallow.
