

WHITE-FRONTED GOOSE IN NEW JERSEY

Two specimens of the White-fronted Goose were collected in southern New Jersey in 1958, one a far northwestern and Alaskan subspecies, and the other a Greenland breeder. The former has been recorded several times along the Atlantic seaboard, while the Greenland bird is but a casual migrant in that area. (*Vide* A.O.U. Check-List, 1957, pp. 65-66.) The following note was received from James Bond, Philadelphia Academy of Natural Sciences.

WHITE-FRONTED GOOSE. Brigantine, N. J., Jan. 4, 1958. Immature female submitted to American Museum of Natural History (Eugene Eisenmann) and Academy of Natural Sciences (J. Bond), where it was identified as a specimen of the Greenland race, *Anser albifrons flavirostris*. Shot by Frank Leek. Specimen in the collection of Nelson D. Hoy, R.D. 1, Media, Pa.

Salem, N. J., Nov. 11, 1958. Adult of undetermined sex submitted in flesh to the Academy of Natural Sciences, where it was identified by J. Bond as *Anser albifrons frontalis*. Shot by James K. Davis.
