BLUEBIRD TRAIL, SPRINGTON RESERVOIR DELAWARE COUNTY, PA

1972 - 1983

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On December 16, 1972 while on the Glenolden Christmas Count, Jesse Grantham and I saw ten Eastern Bluebirds (Sialia sialis). The total number of bluebirds seen by all parties in the count area that year was 16. We saw eight of these in a tight flock near Springton Reservoir. They were in perfect bluebird habitat; open country with scattered trees, cut grass, and a few fruit-bearing trees and shrubs. (Eastern Bluebirds depend almost entirely on wild berries for their winter food supply.)

That winter I decided to establish a Bluebird Trail. With permission from the Suburban Water Company, several cedar nest boxes were placed on their property near the Reservoir. Unfortunately, these boxes were vandalized by Homo sapiens and no birds nested that year.

After repairing the boxes I waited another year and was rewarded by having one box used by a pair of bluebirds. The nest was built of dry grass and contained four blue eggs. Again, this box was damaged and the eggs smashed. For a number of years, human and animal intrusion thwarted the bluebirds' and my efforts to reestablish bluebirds at Springton Reservoir. Finally, in 1979, the bluebirds were successful – seven fledged.

The following data summarize the results of my nesting boxes since 1979:
